So Which Bulb?

It was supposed to be a quick run to the store to pick up a light bulb that had burned out in the clothes dryer, but instead it became a learning, and you might say somewhat of a spiritual experience. As I made my way to the aisle of light bulbs, I soon found myself engulfed in a sea of diverse types, styles, wattage, and brands that left me feeling like I was reading one of those “Where is Waldo” books to my kids again as I searched for the replacement bulb.



There was an entire aisle dedicated to nothing but light bulbs. There were incandescent bulbs, twisted fluorescent, flame shaped, halogen, corn shaped, globe LED, reflector, spot, flood, tube, and mercury bulbs. There were bulbs for the refrigerator, stove ovens, bathroom vanities, night lights, kitchen recessed lighting, and yes finally clothes dryer bulbs. After finding what I needed and making my way out of the aisle, my eye caught a chart that described all the types of bulbs you could buy. As I counted them up, there were over 56 different types of bulbs with an assortment of bases and wattages. Only in America would we have such a variety. Yet, that is when the so-called light came on for me as I thought, it does not matter how many varieties there might be, each of them has the same purpose and that is to shed light.

In Matthew’s gospel account of Jesus’ Sermon on the Mount, Jesus says, “You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others so that they may see your good works and give glory to God.” (Matthew 4:14-16) It appears to be rather simple in that our purpose as disciples of Jesus Christ is to shed light that illumines both the message and ministry of our Lord.

As the pandemic rages on with a record number of infections and deaths, with a nation where we have witnessed the horrific violence on the U.S. Capitol, where families line up for hours sitting in a car hoping that they can get a box of food or people around us suffer silently from abuse, addictions, loneliness, or despair, there is a desperate need for light in the midst of all the darkness.

True, not all of us have the answers, talents, abilities, or resources to address all that we are facing, but that has never been an excuse for the church to let the beacon of light grows dim. Remember how Jesus challenged his disciples to give the multitudes something to eat and used what was brought to him to feed the thousands with leftovers? So, in these dark times, what kind of a light is Jesus asking you to be for your family, your church, and your community, even the one you find hard to love or agree with in these days? Maybe you are to be a nightlight for a frightened soul, a flood light that brings hope and relief for those in need, or a spotlight that shows the way, the truth, and life in walking with the one we say is the Light of the World. Whatever it might be, I urge you to discover what I discovered standing in an aisle filled with light bulbs; and that is we were not created to stay in a box, but to be plugged into Christ and let our light shine that God may be glorified and seen. So, where will you shine today?

Dear Church Family,

Last year during Lent, we had to shut down our in-person gatherings and go into isolation. Well, I'm happy to say that this year during Lent; we will reopen again on a limited basis. **The church council, at the recommendation of our Reopening Task Force, approved a plan to partially reopen our church on Sunday, February 21st.** Here are the details:

All previous rules and requirements for in-person gatherings must be followed, including mask wearing, social distancing, and pre-registration for Sunday worship;

*Our 9am service will be open for limited-seating indoor worship;

*Our 11am service will remain virtual for the time being;

*Details on special services during Holy Week will be available shortly;

*The Fellowship House will remain closed however; groups or committees that need to use it must submit a request to the office to get approval from the Reopening Task Force and Pastor John.

As before, we encourage our high-risk and older individuals, and those with underlying health conditions to continue worshipping online for their own safety. If you do test positive for COVID-19, notify the church office or Pastor John immediately. Your call and condition will be kept confidential.


I am glad that we will start getting together again. Having to shut down in December, though necessary, was a bit of a setback. I am grateful that our leadership has done and continues to do such a thorough job to safeguard our health. I praise God for them and for every time I hear that someone else in our congregation got vaccinated. I have every hope that God will see us through this pandemic.

Still, I know some of our church family are hurting right now—feeling alone, adrift, and disconnected. Maybe one of them is you. We need connection. Yes, we worship and meet online and continue to find ways to serve each other and our community but, not having those regular face-to-face interactions, no matter how small, with one another has taken its toll on our emotional, spiritual, even physical health. The Body of Christ cannot thrive when its parts are disconnected. Reopening again will help but, the truth is, we don't need the church building to stay connected. We need each other. We need to keep reaching out intentionally to each other to talk, listen, laugh or cry with, or just acknowledge that someone cares. Because at the end of the day, we are the Body of Christ bound together not by a building but by the Holy Spirit. We are who Jesus empowers to show his love and compassion to the world, including the members of his own body.

This is my challenge to you before Lent begins. Reach out to someone from church. Someone you know. Someone you sort of know but aren't too familiar with. Someone you see but haven't talked to yet. What about that person who sits near you in the worship service or is in your Sunday school class or grow group? What about that person who worked alongside you in VBS or the one you always see at a church dinner? How about that mom wrangling her kids in the narthex? Or that guy who always sits alone? It doesn't matter if they're not in your circle of friends. It's probably better if they aren't! One of them would love to hear from you. Give them a call or send them an email. See how they're doing. If you don't know their name or number, you can always call the church office and we'll help you find it. It's surprising how much a simple gesture of care can mean to a person. Let us continue to be the Body of Christ together, regardless of whether we're in the building or not, and remind one another that none of us is ever truly alone.

Soon, this pandemic will be behind us. My prayer is that our church will emerge from it with better, stronger, and more faithful relationships with each other and with Jesus Christ. All to the glory of God!

Report by Darlene Simmons, Lay Member to Annual Conference.

Dear GUMC Family,

A special virtual conference of Greater New Jersey was held on January 22 at 4:00 PM. The purpose of the meeting was to adopt a revised budget and legislation to sustain the mission and support its congregation and clergy in light of a recently discovered budget shortfall. Bishop Schol explained that this shortfall in the 2021 budget has created both a financial challenge and an opportunity to refocus and organize for the future mission of GNJ.

GNJ is working diligently to meet a balanced budget and address errors that led to the shortfall. A full investigation by an independent group will be completed by March 10. This review and report will be presented at the May 21st session of Annual Conference. GNJ will reduce costs by \$1 million through a hiring freeze and staff reductions by elimination of positions resulting in 16 open positions. Additional spending within GNJ will be reduced.

The revised budget and legislation were approved by the Conference. Local churches such as ours will see an increase to our Conference-subsidizes healthcare expenses and property insurance. The Conference will present new insurance programs to reduce the cost to the local church to the Annual Conference in May 2021. We and all GNJ congregations must make every effort to pay 100% of our shared ministries and billables.

As we move forward, adjustments to our own budget will need to be addressed. While this is a challenge, we have a confident, wise and experienced finance team and church council to help us meet it. Our church has a history of working to make things happen and the generosity of our congregation is unsurpassed. We will be required to review our budget and develop a plan to meet our new billables and shared ministry expenses by March 1st. We will keep you updated as this develops.

Let's pray for GNJ and for our finance team, church council, and congregation as we adjust to keep our mission and ministries going. As always, keep the faith and thank you for your support.

The Trading Post cabinet is back on the Fellowship House porch, where it provides personal care items 24/7 to anyone who needs them. Mission team members will check and refill the cabinet as needed. Thanks are extended to Jess Heritage who painted the lettering and artwork.

Men of Armor meets biweekly on Tuesdays. This Grow Group meets on ZOOM and during warm weather, gets together outside at men's homes. Charlie Adams (cprs619@yahoo.com) is the contact person to get the ZOOM meeting information and schedule.

During the month of February, our Children & Family Ministries team is focusing on the "Love your Neighbor" campaign. This is to focus our minds and energy on showing God's love to everyone even in disagreements and in an unsettled world. "YOUR church loves you!" "MY church loves you", will be sayings you will hear and see a lot over the next month. We will offer a biweekly study titled "Reckless Love" at 9:30 am on Saturdays. Each Sunday at 10:15am, our Sunday School program will have activities and learnings for your children!







Celebrating love

For 80 years, a couple in Ecuador was an exceptional example of marital love. Julio Cesar Mora Tapia, 110, and Waldramina Maclovia Quinteros Reyes, 104, were wed on February 7, 1941. Until Julio's death last October, they were reportedly the world's oldest married couple. Their large family includes nine great-great-grandchildren!

Good News Network recounts: "Julio Cesar fell in love with Waldramina's beauty, her conversation, and her big heart." Meanwhile, she found in him "a poet with a young spirit." The

couple says the formula for a lasting marriage is “love + maturity + mutual respect,” as well as patience, compassion and hard work.

That calls to mind Paul’s words, often read at weddings: “Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth” (1 Corinthians 13:4-6, ESV).

Laud & honor on Palm Sunday

The Palm Sunday anthem “All Glory Laud and Honor” is one of Christendom’s oldest hymns. St. Theodulf of Orleans, who helped reform the church under Charlemagne, wrote the lyrics in the year 820 while imprisoned in France.

The lyrics recount Jesus’ triumphal entry into Jerusalem, an event the medieval church reenacted every Palm Sunday. Clergy and townspeople processed from fields through the city gates, behind a Jesus figure riding a donkey. At the gates, children began singing the hymn in Latin — *Gloria, laus et honor* — and onlookers soon chimed in.

City gates may be a thing of the past, as the website Hymnary.org notes, yet we still praise our blessed Redeemer “because we know just what kind of King he was and is — an everlasting King who reigns not just in Jerusalem but over the entire earth. What more could we do but praise him with glory, laud and honor.”

All glory, laud and honor to you, Redeemer, King,
to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring.
You are the King of Israel and David’s royal Son,
now in the Lord’s name coming, the King and Blessed One.

Feline-informed faith

As I type, Tina sits on my lap, often reaching to rest a paw on my hand (the one on the mouse, of course!). Yet, as any cat lover knows, these animals can be stubbornly aloof — at least until mealtime.



My cats’ actions make me think about how intentional daily Bible reading is like pressing myself against God. When I see God’s presence in nature or someone’s kindness, pausing to give thanks is like reaching out to touch God’s hand. Paying it back — and forward

During the pandemic, acts of kindness seemed especially meaningful. Last spring, as Covid-19 hit Native American communities particularly hard, an interesting transatlantic outreach occurred. Donations from Ireland began appearing in a relief fund for Navajo and Hopi families, leading administrators to suspect the account had been hacked. Then they realized a cross-generational payback was underway.

In 1847, Choctaw Tribe members sent \$170 overseas to Ireland to help with Potato Famine relief. That generosity was never forgotten, and by May 2020, people in Ireland had contributed more than \$4 million toward pandemic assistance for relatives of people who’d helped their ancestors. Many donors included an Irish proverb meaning “In each other’s shadows the people live.”

The concept of paying it forward dates back to a 1784 letter by Benjamin Franklin. It also echoes Jesus’ Golden Rule: “Do to others as you would have them do to you” (Luke 6:31). How might you live out this practice today?

A breath of fresh prayer



Norwegian theologian Ole Hallesby described prayer as simply letting God into our lives. God “knocks,” he said, “not only in the solemn hours of secret prayer” but “in the midst of your daily work, your daily struggles, your daily grind ... when you need him most.”

Prayer, added Hallesby, is as essential to life as air. “As impossible as it is for us to take a breath in the morning large enough to last us until noon, so impossible is it to pray in the morning in such a way as to last us until noon,” he said. “Let your prayers ascend to [God] constantly, audibly or silently, as circumstances throughout the day permit.”
